The first order of business was clearing up the confusion of what time the meetings were to be held. It was decided that the Board meetings were to begin at 8:00 p.m. and all public chapter meetings were to begin at 7:30 p.m.

Bob Herndon brought a brochure describing the Wildlife Photography Contest sponsored by the Dorchester Artc Center and the U.S. Dept. of Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service. The contest and resulting exhibit are to be held at the Blackwater Visiter Center, Cambridge, Maryland 21613. The judging will be March 3 and the exhibit will be open to the public until March 31, 1973. Bob volunteered to assist anyone interested in entering the contest as he has had entries in the past.

It was pointed out that the meeting area for all birding trips is to be the parking lot immediately adjacent of the "Other Barn" at Oakland Mills at 7:30 a.m.

Ted presented the Treasurer's report in the absence of David Holmes. Deposits amounted to \$87.50, deposits waiting were \$14.50, and check to the State organization for dues was \$44.00, making a balance of \$58.00. The chapter has 28 members; 8 husband/wife, 10 single, and 1 sustaining couple.

It was suggested that a thank you note be sent to Chan Robbins for his fine presentation at our first public meeting. Nan Rhinelander said she would take care of it.

The officers discussed the last public meeting and suggestions were made on how to improve the next ones. Plans were made to have a regular "Field Trip Report"; these would be reports on the fields trips that had been taken since the last meeting. Also have pertinent information on the field trips to be taken; namely the nature of the field trip -- long waling, how to dress, how rough the terrain, etc. It was also suggested that a "call-in" number be given for people to "reserve" space on next trip (telling the leaders how many will be expected to attend). An idea was brought forth to have a "feeder field trip". This would consist of traveling around the immediate area visiting well attended bird feeders.

More details were given concerning upcoming meetings and planned field trips. The trip to Bombay Hook is planned for January 14 with a snow date of Jan. 21. Bob Herndon will be the leader and everyone is urged to bring their own lunch. It was suggested that there be a preview of slides of possible sightings at Bombay Hook at our next public meeting. Al Geis will lead the Woodock Area bird walk on January 20 in the Little Patauxent River Valley. This field trip will be for one-half day and it is recommended that one dress warmly and wear boots, and be forewarmed that it will be a same strenous walk. The February public

meeting is to be held February 8 at 7:30 p.m. It was tentatively planned to have the "feeder trip" on February 10. This would be a good trip for those who cannot attend a more energetic trip or for those who would like to bring their children. The three day trip to Chincoteague with intermediate stops is planned for the weekend of February 17. Peggy suggested that possibly Larry would be willing to be one of the leaders for that trip. The schedule would be: leave from Oakland Mills parking lot 7:30 a.m. Saturday morning, stop at Blackwater on way down, get to Chincoteague late Saturday afternoon. Spend all day Sunday in Chincoteague and on Assateague, and return home after lunch Monday. The two hotels recommended for contacting for reservations were the Mariner and the Lighthouse. Bob said he would write to them leeting them know we were coming down as a group. The next field trip would be March 11 to the Blackwater Refuge, among other attractions would be the exhibit resulting from the Wildlife Photography Contest. And finally, a local bird wlk on March 17. No definite plans as yet.

The suggestion was made to have "permanent" name-tags for members to wear at each meeting so we can all get better acquainted and match phone voices with faces.

Peggy volunteered to have some made up for the next meeting.

It was decided to have another membership category, namely "Senior". The dues would be \$4.00 for single adult and \$5.00 for husband/wife. One may qualify for "Senior" membership after reaching age 65. Those who are in this category and have already paid full amount of dues will be given the opportunity to apply for a rebate.

NEW BUSINESS

Reviewed Field Trips for February and March. Change: meeting place for field trips from Oakland Mills to Swansfield Elementary School. Additional field trips are: April 13, 14, tand 15 is the State Meeting at Ocean City; April 29 will be to Patapsco State Park, Glenartney -- Warbler Walk; May 5, May Count; May 20, Sugar Loaf Mountain, New Design Road; and May 13, Dr. Geis Woodcock Field Trip with possibly a family picnic before the Woodcock display.

Had further discussions concerning continuing field trips on into the summer months, notably July and August. Some suggestions along this line were: a "Wading Trip" through Middle Patuxent River between Routes 32-108; a trip to nesting area in Delaware at Cape Henlopen; and some more activitles for the junior membership.

It was decided to dispense with the regular monthly meeting for July and August and just have the field trips. Ted said he had a tentative speaker for the June 14 meeting. It was suggested that Longwood Gardens, Kennett Square, Pennsylvania would make a nice June field trip. Larry Hood volunteered to be leader for this trip.

Donna Herbst handed out copies of the membership lists current to February 1. She mentioned there was interest (from membership questionnaires) in "learning classes". If possible, it was suggested that we could set up slide, lecture programs to give in someone's home on a small group basis at other times than regular meetings. Chan Robbins has something along this line. Larry is to check on a Waterfowl slide show he knows about through the Bureau, that meeting date to be February 22.

Dr. Klaes was given the floor to explain his thoughts concerning the beginning of a serious junior program. His first suggestion was to have the children fill out questionnaires to find out the main fields of interest, age groups, and who had perents who might be interested in being leaders. Donna said her membership lists had turned up some people interested in helping. Ted suggested using calling numbers to find basis of members' children. Publicity in newspapers, etc. would bring out non-member children. A possiblility would be to have separate meetings. A question arose, would there be separate programs -- one for dues paying members and a program for the public. Field trips are very popular with this age group. There would have to be a definition of age groups, possibly 8-11 and 12 to 18. Some programs could be identification classes, special projects (with short time goal), tree identification, rocks, fossils, marine organisms. The object would be to learn about the segments and then bring it all together for long range conservation-ecology. National Audubon Society has learning kits and summer comps. Appelacian Hiking Group might work with us. It was suggested that John Trott, biology teacher at Bergundy Farm School, would be a good person to contact because of his many years working with children. Others would be: the "ecology" man at Reston (Larry is to look this up); National Park Service; National Wildlife Federation - Ranger Rick. Washington Zoo Aviary House would be a good trip.

Ted brought a note from the Montesorie School that they would like a speaker to come visit their school and give a short talk about birds to the children. Interest is very high and they would like to have someone very badly. David Wo lines and Barbara Warfield were suggested to be contacted.

It was suggested that we have a "Conservation Alert" concerning phoning members to tell them of meetings to be held that would be of interest to us along the conservation line.

Dr. Zeleny called and remined us that we must submit a letter of petition for acceptance into the state organization in time for the next trustees meeting (date as yet unset). With this letter should go a copy of the Chapter By-laws.





Minutes of board meeting held on April 29, 1976 at Jo Solem's

Present were Ben Dawson, Lucille Peters, Kris Krishnamoorthy, Paul Zucker, Jo Solem, Anita Conron, Alice Fazekas, Eileen and John Clegg, Cathy Williamson, Tom Moyer, and Marty Chestem.

The minutes of the preceding board meeting were read by Lucille and approved.

The treasury report was given by Ben. The present balance was \$171.54, and there were 71 active, paid members. The treasury was then turned over to Kris, the new treasurer.

Jo requested book reviews for the newsletter.

Kris reported that the status of the bookstore was unchanged.

Present were Ben and Frances Dawson, Lucille Peters, Kris Krishnamoorthy, Paul Zucker, Jo Solem, Cathy and Leroy Williamson, Eileen and John Clegg, Tom Moyer, Bob Herndon, and Marty Chestem.

The minutes of the preceding board meeting were read by Paul and approved.

Kris reported that the balance in the treasury was still \$171.54. 156.56 Ceruded PAZ

- Jo announced that the newsletter would appear every other month during the coming year. By publishing every other month, postage would be saved and the quality of the newsletter would increase. A feature was planned for each issue on the subject of attracting birds. Jo was also assembling a list of people for a rare bird alert network.
- Tom reported that Colonel Bodenstein would be the speaker for the September program with a subject of marshes . The October program would feature the Cleggs showing pictures from their trip to Alaska. It was suggested that travel expenses be offered to out-of-town speakers and that they be invited out to dinner. The board agreed and authorized Tom to offer such speakers a sum of money for travel based on his estimate of distance and a rate of 15c per mile.
- Kris reported that the bookstore was ordering books in preparation for the September meeting.
- Frances brought up the subject of responding to membership inquiries. It was decided that questions be forwarded or directed to Alice or Kris, both of whom would have extra membership forms and newsletters to send out. Eileen suggested that membership forms be sent to local libraries and be taken to community programs we present. The board agreed. Cathy mentioned that we have been invited to send a schedule of our meetings to a local wilderness activities newsletter.

- The minutes of the preceding board meeting were read by Paul and approved after ammending the Treasurer's report.
- Kris reported that 43 members were already paid up for the year. \$128 was sent to the MOS leaving \$250.06 in the treasury. The membership questionnaires showed that there was great interest in the field trip program and in joint trips with other MOS chapters.
- Jo mentioned that there were over 20 people who were interested in the rare bird alert which we are trying to set up. It was suggested that those people usually at home be contacted early, and that each of these people would call a couple of others, starting the chain in many places. John suggested publishing the bird information phone numbers for all parts of the country.
- Jo mentioned that the Indoor workshop is slated for March 19 at the Glenelg country school and that the Patuxent club would participate. co-spousor the went,
- Lucille reported on a meeting held by the county soil conservation district about proposed new food control dams in the Lower and Middle Patuxent river watersheds. Subsequent community meetings will be held on November 3 and 22.
- Marcia reported that six books of \$26.43 list price suffered some water damage and would be sold in a sale. Otherwise the bookstore has an inventory valued at \$304,50 plus \$191.71 in cash. A discussion ensued about the commitment of sending bookstore proceeds to the MOS sanctuary fund. It was decided that no binding commitment was ever made, only an expression of intent. Marcia stated that the bookstore could spare \$100, and the board approved a motion that a proposal be made to the chapter that \$50 be donated to the MOS sanctuaries and that \$50 be donated to the Cape May Bird Observatory.
- Cathy reported that 20 people went on the Patapsco field trip and that 41 species of birds were seen including several warblers. Jo mentioned that 21 people attended the fern walk she led and that a dozen ferns were seen and identified. The success of this trip was taken as an indication of interest in the chapter in areas of natural history besides birds. Bob suggeste d that the club contemplate some habitat walks with experienced leaders and perhaps in conjunction with the Baltimore club. - The minutes of the preceding board meeting were read by Paul .ammended. and approved.
- A discussion ensued about the procedure of sending the \$50 contribution approved by the chapter to the Cape May Bird Observatory. Bob agreed to write a cover letter, and Kris would prepare the check and find out the address. A similar procedure would be followed for sending another \$50 contribution approved by the chapter to the MOS sanctuary fund.
- Kris gave the field trip report. The October 9-11 trip to Brigantine and Cape May had eleven participants and recorded 115 species, the club record for a trip. The October 23 trip to the Columbia Lakes had seven participants and sighted 30 species. The upcoming trips were November 7 to Wagoner's gap to be led by Kris with a 7:30 AM departure; December 12 feeder trip to be led by Nan with an 8 AM departure; and the Christmas count for Howard county scheduled for December 24. A Howard county coordinator is needed for the count. Much consternation was expressed over the date for the count, the lack of input from the chapter on the selection of the date, and about the fact that this would be the second year in a row that this count was given an undesirable date. - Kris gave the field trip report. The November 7 trip to Wagoner's Gap had thirteen participants who saw a total of 26 species, including four Golden Eagles, seven kinds of hawks, and a Common Loon. A discussion ensued regarding the possible purchase of a \$30 authoritative reference book on hawks. It was not felt that the club should build a reference library or donate books to a local library. Minutes of Board meeting held on January 27, 1977 at Kris Krishnamoorthy's

- Present were Lucille Peters, Kris and Marcia Krishnamoorthy, Paul Zucker, Cathy Williamson, Jo Solem, Marty Chestem, and Eileen Clegg.
- The meeting was chaired by Lucille since Ben was not present.
- The minutes of the preceding board meeting were read by Paul and approved.
- Kris reported that the treasury had a balance of \$256.56, and that the club had 68 paid members.
- Lucille described the upcoming programs. The February meeting would be at Nan's house and feature slides taken by club members. The March meeting would have Ben Shirey speaking on reptiles and amphibians.
- Cathy reported that the January 23 field trip attracted 9 people who identified 32 shrubs and trees and saw some birds at feeders. Future trips are a feeder trip on February 5 to be led by Nan, the Chincoteague-Irish Grove trip for the February 19-21 weekend, and a trip on March 27 to Bombay Hook. Eight or nine people had signed up for the Chincoteague trip. There was some question about heat in the Irish Grove accommodations and whether the bay would be frozen, thus the possibility of going to Chincoteague and Ocean City was being considered.
- The subject of slide shows was discussed. Bob Herndon was working on the problem but was not present to discuss it so it was agreed he would be contacted.
- Eileen drew attention to a proposed Department of the Interior regulation that would ban the use of lead shot along several flyways (including throughout most of Maryland). Eileen agreed to write a letter from the club in support of the regulation The board supported this action.
- Marty described an article about the large bird feeding operation in New Jersey where helicopters were being used to distribute corn over frozen marshes. She mentioned that many local birds were also suffering and wondered if there wasn't something that local clubs could be doing in this regard. She agreed to investigate.
- Marcia reported that the bookstore had some new books on order. She mentioned that the new person handling the bookstore in Baltimore seemed very capable and that we would order jointly with the Baltimore chapter ,obtaining better discounts.
- Jo discussed the March 19 workshop. There would be six presentations given during three 75 minute sessions (most of them twice) and an arts and crafts exhibit. It was agreed that the exhibit start at 12:30 and that the presentations would start at 1:15. An effort would be made to publicize the workshop using the Flyer and possibly putting up posters.
- Jo gave the nominating committee report. The committee consisted of Jo, Marty, and Marjory Mountjoy. The slate consisted of Lucille for President, John Glegg for Vice President, Kris for Treasurer, Cynthia Bunnell for Secretary, and Bob Herndon for Trustee.
- Jo mentioned that she asked Banny Bystrak for the Christmas count materials and that he indicated that he was not interested in relinquishing the count. The board agreed not to press the issue.
- Eileen suggested that the club send Kathy Klimkiewicz complimentary newsletters since she has been so active and helpful. The board agreed.

- The minutes of the previous board meeting were read by Paul and approved.
- It was announced that Kathy Klimkiewicz was grateful for receiving the complimentary chapter newsletters. Ben raised the question of whether we should send our newsletters, to other MOS chapters.
- Kris reported that the treasury had a balance of \$234.96 and that the chapter had 69 paid members.
- Bob mentioned the need to set some goals for the development of the chapter's slide shows. Nan mentioned that the Eastern Shore series could be revamped for educational purposes and that it was not currently popular. She felt priority should be placed on the show dealing with the nesting birds of Howard county. Bob proposed that a committee meet to discuss the slide shows, and a meeting was called for March 6 at 7PM at Bob's house. Nan also suggested that the shows could be registered with the Federated Garden Clubs.
- Cathy announced the recent and upcoming field trips. The trip to Chincoteague and Océan City on February 19-21 had four participants led by Bob Herndon and recorded 95 species of birds including a Woodcock and a Rough Legged Hawk. The club's indoor workshop on March 19 was announced. On Sunday March 27 a trip to Bombay Hook and Little Creek would take place (meet at Swansfield 7:30AM). A trip for Woodcock in April was under consideration. On Sunday April 24 Jo would lead a wildflower walk starting at 1:30 PM. An all day trip will be led by Kris to the C and O Canal on April 30 (meet 6AM at Swansfield or 7AM at Pennyfield lock). May 7 was announced as the date of the May count.
- Eileen reported that the National Wildlife Federation would not send a copy of the filmstrip "World of Endangered Wildlife" for preview but that the price would be refunded if we ordered it and did not like it. She thought that \$22.50 was not an unreasonable price and that the club should consider it. The consensus was to try and obtain the strip through a library before deciding if the club wanted a copy.
- Bob suggested that the chapter meetings could be enlivened by showing a few slides at the start and having people quickly guess the number of birds on each slide.

Kathy wants to plan field trips 6 months (Aug - Jan) in advance at the next bird meeting so asked that we bring calendars and ideas. She then reported on the trip to Bombay Hook - 12 people went with a total of 56 species. The Pectoral Sandpiper was the best sighting on an otherwise very quiet day.

Kris reported that there are now 70 members and we have a balance of \$226.96. Anita mentioned a problem with the carousel and it was suggested that it be fixed over the summer.

John Clegg reported on conservation articles that he noticed in the Post. 2,530 acres were purchased beside Blackwater which should help the bald eagles. Two articles were spotted that refer to the dam project with one for and one against. Eileen stated that a letter was sent to the Howard County government endorsing obtaining the Schooly Mill tract for conservation.
