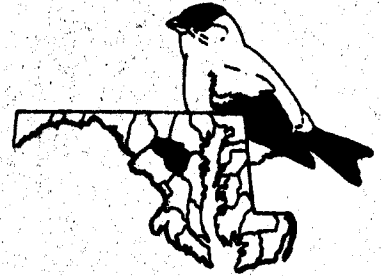

RECEPTION AND DINNER SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 20, 1983, TO HONOR CHANDLER S. ROBBINS

The Howard County Chapter of the Maryland Ornithological Society will give a reception and dinner on Sunday, November 20 in honor of Chandler S. Robbins, senior author of Birds of North America, to mark the recent publication of the revised edition of this best-selling field guide.

The free reception will be held in the Florence Bain Senior Center, Joseph Square, in Columbia from 2:00-5:00 p.m. and is open to the public. Mr. Robbins will be available to autograph copies of the guide which will be on sale. This is a rare opportunity to meet and chat with one of North America's premier birders. Mr. Robbins has been a biologist for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for 35 years. In addition to or as a part of his duties, he is also a bird bander, author and editor and frequently presents papers to ornithological societies in this country and abroad. He is recognized as one of the nation's outstanding field birders and has received a number of awards including the Arthur Allen and Paul Bartsch Medals. A long-time friend of this chapter he has presented programs for us and each year participates in the May Count in this county as well as the Triadelphia Christmas Count which includes this region.

After the reception a dinner will be held at the Columbia Inn. Reservations may be made by returning the form on the last page of this newsletter along with your check. 1983 HOWARD COUNTY BIRD LIST TO BE COMPILED BY DAVID HOLMES

Beginning with 1979, the Howard County Chapter revived the practice of compiling a master list of every bird species seen in the county during a calendar year. Members submit lists of those species they have seen during the year and the compilation is printed in a newsletter. David Holmes, 5643-A Harpers Farm Rd., Columbia, MD 21044 would appreciate receiving your 1983 sightings by January 15, 1984. The length of your list doesn't matter for you may have recorded the only Mourning Warbler, Gray-checked Thrush or Cattle Egret seen during the year. Other than Barred Owls we often have trouble with records for some of the other owls. Likewise Horned Larks and Water Pipits are elusive species. If you are new to this county or new to birding start in January to keep track of the birds you see during 1984 in Howard County. By December you may be surprised by the length of the list.

FROGS AS BIRD PREDATORS - Alice Grant

Twice in the years before 1981 we found small birds with broken necks floating in our 6'x 10' pond. One was discovered, I believe, in 1979 and the other in 1980. Their presence remained a mystery for several years. One morning in the summer of 1981 Olif was enjoying his early morning coffee watching an immature robin hop along the edge of the pond when he saw a large frog jump out of the water and grab the bird by the neck and immediately disappear with it under water. Within a few seconds the bird reappeared on the surface with a broken neck. Since that incident we have found two more birds with broken necks (both House Sparrows) floating on the water, one during the summer of 1982 and the other in August of 1983.

Our pond contains both Green Frogs (Rana clamitans) and Bullfrogs (R. catesbeiana). When I feed the fish by throwing pieces of bread to them, occasionally a large frog will jump completely out of the water, grab the bread in mid-air and immediately submerge. Within a few seconds the bread pops to the surface again, presumably because the frog finds it unpalatable. These experiences suggest that the larger species of frogs in this area are a clear danger to small birds either drinking or bathing at pond or lake edges.

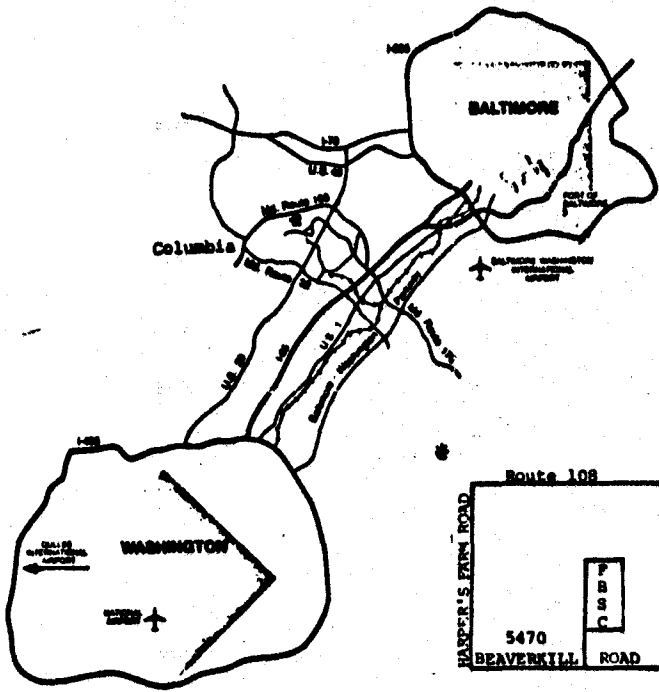

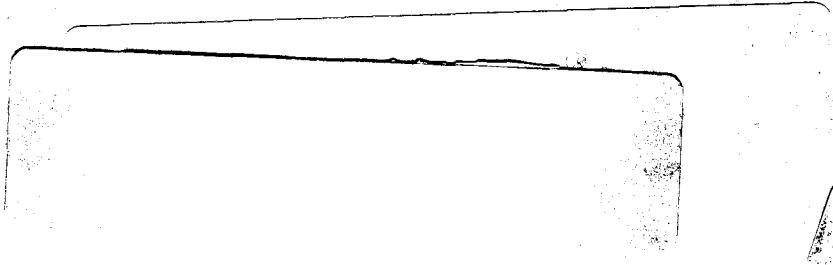

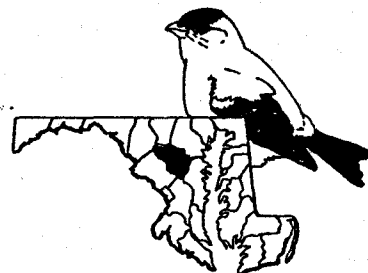

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BOOK SIGNING AND RECEPTION TO HONOR CHANDLER S. ROBBINS

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The free reception will be held in the Florence Bain Senior Center, Joseph Square, 5470 Beaverkill Road, Columbia, Maryland from 2:00-5:00 p.m. and is open to the public. Mr. Robbins will be available to autograph copies of the guide which will be on sale. This is a rare opportunity to meet and chat with one of North America's premier birders.

Mr. Robbins is a biologist in Migratory Non-gamebird Studies at U. S. Fish & Wildlife's Patuxent Wildlife Research Center and lives in Laurel, Maryland. He is an Elected Fellow of the national bird society, the American Ornithologists' Union, a member of the Wilson Ornithological Society, numerous other bird and bird-banding societies, and the Maryland Chapter of the Nature Conservancy. He conducted population studies of the Common Snipe, contributed toward the solution of the conflict of albatrosses and planes on Midway Island, helped in some of the earliest studies of the effects of DDT on birds, and helped revise methods of reporting bird banding information.

In 1979 he was honored by the presentation of the Department of the Interior's Meritorious Service Award. He was presented the Bartsch Award by the Audubon Naturalist Society of the Central Atlantic States and the Arthur A. Allen Award by the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology. In Dr. Douglas A. Lancaster's introductory



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remarks at the presentation of the Arthur A. Allen Award to Mr. Robbins, he said: "He helped institute, with James Baird of the Massachusetts Audubon Society, a long-range program for banding birds along the coastal areas of Eastern North America. The banding program represents only one of the major efforts by Chan Robbins that has contributed valuable information to the science as well as enlisting the enthusiasm of an army of volunteers. In 1965 Chan Robbins initiated the well-known breeding bird survey."

Data from this survey and from his years of spot-mapping the territories of forest birds indicate to him and to others that many of our birds that winter in the tropics are increasingly threatened by the loss of habitat. These birds arrive late after their insect food is available, have time for only one nest attempt, and need a large continuous forest where such enemies as cowbirds, cats, and raccoons are not overwhelming.
