WINTER BIRD RECORDS DECEMBER 1, 2007 TO FEBRUARY 29, 2008

relatively mild winter produced some lovely birds including two new county records. Headliners included Ross's Goose, Long-tailed Duck, Red-necked Grebe, Northern Goshawk, Rough-legged Hawk, Sandhill Crane, Red-headed Woodpecker, Northern Saw-whet Owl, Longeared Owl, Marsh Wren, Whitecrowned Sparrow (Gambel's), Common Redpoll, and Evening Grosbeak.

As usual, a few Snow Geese wintered. The high was four on 12/19 at MD99/Camden Meadows Ct where there were 3 wh. (1 ad.) and 1 bl. ad. (NM). The season's choicest sighting and a new county record was an adult white phase Ross's Goose on 12/17 at MD94/Florence Rd (BHi, ph.). It stayed for a few hours and left at sunset. Despite intense searching during the following days, it was seen just once more on the morning of 12/19 in a large flock of Canada Geese at MD99/Camden Meadows where it was being harassed by other geese (NM). The Ross's was last seen taking off with a small flock of Canadas heading in a southerly direction. Cackling Geese are noted in small numbers each winter. This season's high was three on 12/20 at Brighton Dam (TFe,GKg). Twenty-eight Gadwall were present at the Race Road

(Records continued from page 1) wetlands 2/27 (a new high) (NM); 18 at Centennial on 1/26 were an unusually high number for that park (NM). A skittish flock of 121 Mallards was watched at a secluded pond on Jennings Chapel Rd 2/2, probably truly wild birds (MW). A pair of Redheads visited Centennial 12/9 (KS) to 12/12 (EH). As usual, a few Canvasbacks, Ring-necked Ducks, and Buffleheads wintered. A Greater Scaup stayed at Warfields Pond Pk from 1/10 (**BHi**) to 1/20 (**KS**); another was present at Centennial 1/13 (J&TDC). Long-tailed Ducks were recorded in each winter month: 12/1 Triadelphia Reservoir (**BHi-**1) and 12/9 (**JSh**-7), 1/3 Centennial (**JCu-**1), and 2/2 Triadelphia (**NM-**1). The only Common Goldeneye was found at Triadelphia 12/1 (BHi). A few Hooded Mergansers were present all winter. The six on 1/9 at Wilde Lake (**CN**) swelled to \sim 25 by 2/25 (**J&TDC**); 28 were still there 2/28 (HZ). Once again Common Mergansers were attracted to Triadelphia with numbers increasing from eight on 12/12 (**EH**) to 1,800+ (a new high) on 1/5 (NM).

Wild Turkeys were noted at five locations: 12/1 Triadelphia (JHb-12), 2/2 Annapolis Rock Rd (JSh+-2), 2/5 Alpha Ridge landfill (BMy-1), early Feb. along MD216 (HMz-2), and 2/13 Duvall Rd (KTf-2). The Pied-billed Grebe high was four on 12/1 Lake Elkhorn (**SN**). An ice storm dropped a Horned Grebe into a yard on Nodding Night in River Hill on 2/13. Rehabber Judy Holzman picked it up so it could be released on water in order to take off. A Red-necked Grebe on Wilde Lake 2/24 tied the early county

date (Wilde Lake 1984) (**JHf**). Photographs revealed a downcurved upper mandible crossing the lower one. The bird remained into March.

Bald Eagle sightings continued to increase countywide. During the few weeks in January when ponds and lakes were frozen, eagles concentrated near Brighton Dam. On 1/26, at least 24 were counted (9 ad., 11 im., 4 sub-ad.) (NM). On Howard County Midwinter Count (HCMC) 2/2, 17 were tallied at the dam (NM) and an additional seven were noted in other parts of the county. An immature Northern Goshawk was watched and, fortunately, photographed 12/15 over the University of Maryland Central Farm (UMDCF) (W&SE,M& **GMcC**). Because the identification was not easy, Sue's photos were invaluable. From them, Laurie Goodrich of Hawk Mt. Sanctuary was able to identify the bird. On HCMC 2/2 an im. No. Goshawk was reported within one-half mile of the Dec. site (SS,MVk). A light phase Rough-legged Hawk was spotted just south of the landfill on 2/17 near I-70/US40 East (M&GMcC). A Merlin was noted on 2/2 at W. Friendship (JCu) and on 2/3 along McKendree Rd (B&GHi).

A few American Coots were reported (NM; WEb,R&SPo). One that appeared at Warfields PP on 2/16 (B&GHi) was still present on 2/28 (KTf). A Sandhill Crane (fourth county record) made an appearance for a few hours at Brighton Dam 1/6 (JS,NM,EH+, ph.).

Despite the relatively mild winter, **Killdeer** numbers were low. The high was five at MD32/MD99 on

2/6 (WE). Wilson's Snipe were noted twice at UMDCF: 12/15 (W&SE,M&GMcC-1) and 2/8 (BO,EH-2). A few warm days produced four American Woodcock the evening of 2/9 at PRSP (W&SE,TFe,KHf,KD+). They were also present near Sykesville from 2/18 on (FLv).

Bonaparte's Gull sightings extended into Dec.: 12/1 Triadelphia 2 (1 ad.) (JHb; EH) and 12/9 Centennial 1 (KS). Ring-billed Gulls hit 130 on Triadelphia 12/1 (BHi), including a yellow wingtagged one from Chicago, Ill., May 2007. Late winter peaks were 270 on 2/6 at MD99/E. Watersville Rd (WE) and 205 on 2/18 along A.E. Mullinix Rd (KTf). The season's lone Great Black-backed Gull was spotted 12/15 near Pigtail (MW).

Owls were well-reported with a nest of **Great Horned Owls** along Snowden River Pkwy for the second consecutive year (**KS**). A **Long-eared Owl** wintered at PRSP (**JSh+**). There were multiple reports of **Northern Saw-whet Owls** at PRSP (**JSh+**). A saw-whet was also found 12/15 at MD32 n.e. of Linden Church Rd (**W&SE**, **M&GMcC**).

Red-headed Woodpeckers are scarce county birds. Four on 2/2 (all on private property) were unprecedented: Jennings Chapel Rd (MW-1), Forsythe Rd, (D&MH-1 im.), and west of MD97 (W&SE-2 ad.). Common Ravens were seen twice: 1/7 PRSP (R&JG - also heard) and 1/10 along US29 north of MD175 (NM). At least a dozen Red-breasted Nuthatch reports were received with no more than two at any location. On 2/24, a

Carolina Wren got an early start nest building in Clary's Forest, W. Columbia (FP). A Marsh Wren spotted in the large patch of cattails at Font Hill Pk 1/5 was just the second Jan. record (JTv).

A high of four **Hermit Thrushes** was recorded 1/12 at Schoolev Mill Pk (**NM**). A lingering **Gray** Catbird was last seen at Talbots Landing 12/22 (**R&JG**); one was still present at Centennial 2/2 (ML). Two Brown Thrashers were seen on 2/2: one at Rockburn Branch Pk (**BO,EH**) and one along the Patuxent Branch Trail (MSt,BMi). The largest flock of American Pipits detected was a low 15 on 12/4 at Florence Rd/ Shaffersville Rd (WE). Cedar Waxwings roamed in sizeable numbers with 100+ on 12/5 at Warfield PP (BHi) and 125 there on 1/8 (**KTf**). On 2/27, a flock of 250+ descended on ~20 ornamental trees at the Columbia Mall where they feasted on softened fruit—a memorable sight (MBt).

Yellow-rumped Warblers on HCMC 2/2 set a new high of 90, significantly above the old record of 58. Two Pine Warblers wintered. The one at an Allview suet feeder (for the third winter) was present 12/15-2/22 (JMcK). Another, reported on 1/7 (fide DN), had been appearing daily for several weeks at a Carrigan Dr suet feeder.

American Tree Sparrows were concentrated at UMDCF where there were 38 on 2/2 (M&GMcC) and 46 (a new high) on 2/8 (BO,EH). Singles were at Schooley MP 12/15 (NM), MPEA 12/19 (BHi), and W. Friendship 12/28 (JCu); two were at Western

Reg. Pk 1/5 along with four **Fox** Sparrows (JW). Seven Chipping **Sparrows** were present at Alpha Ridge landfill 12/28 (RC). The sparrow highlight of the season was the county's first Whitecrowned Sparrow of the Gambel's subspecies—an adult on 2/2 at a silage pit along Florence Rd south of Shaffers Mill Rd (TFe). On 2/3, while searching for the adult, an immature (first winter) was unwittingly photographed at the same site (BHi), where it was spotted again 2/8 (NM,EH,JS). Both birds were seen and photographed 2/9 (TFe). The high count of Dark-eyed Juncos was 80+ at Wynfield 1/21 (**RC**).

The only **Eastern Meadowlarks** were two on 1/8 at Western RP (**KTf**). An ad. male **Baltimore Oriole** was noted at Burleigh Manor 12/19 and then regularly through the season feeding on hulled sunflower seeds (**JHp**); one was also seen at several locations along Iron Pen Pl. in W. Columbia from early Jan. to 1/26 (**RKr**; **FDw**).

Northern invasives enlivened the winter. Purple Finches were widely reported with highs of 30 on 2/21 at Walt-Ann Dr (CSt) and 20 on 2/26 at Duvall Rd (**KTf**). The single Common Redpoll sighting was 12/7 in Clary's Forest (FP). Pine Siskins, often one or two with large flocks of American Goldfinches, appeared from 11/23 to 2/24 (**RC, KD/KHf,** NM, BO, FP, ES). Evening Grosbeaks, a rarity in the last two decades, were noted twice: 2/2 McKendree Rd near Rover Mill Rd (POs-2[1 m.]) and 2/4 PRSP headquarters, Annapolis Rock Rd (MSty-2 f.).

Two leucistic birds were reported: a **Canada Goose** 2/24 at W. Friendship with normal head and neck coloring but a white body and wings (**JCu**), and a **House Sparrow** 2/23 at Swansfield, W. Col. with white on the top of the head, nape, and back (**JTv**).

TWENTY-THIRD HOWARD COUNTY MIDWINTER COUNT, FEBRUARY 2, 2008

A mostly sunny day with partly open water, little wind and 32° F - 45° F temperatures combined for pleasant birding. The day, plus a relatively mild winter, an excellent fruit crop, and northern irruptives enabled us to tie the record high of 94 species! A recognized subspecies of the Whitecrowned Sparrow (Gambel's) was recorded as a new county bird.

For species seen on at least 12 previous counts, 18 new highs were established compared to nine lows. New high totals were Gadwall 19, Common Merganser 1,580, Bald Eagle 24, Red-headed Woodpecker 4, Red-bellied Woodpecker 364, White-breasted Nuthatch 362, Ruby-crowned Kinglet 18, Eastern Bluebird 461 (t), and Yellowrumped Warbler 90. Second highs were Ring-necked Duck 184, Hooded Merganser 67, Cooper's Hawk 13, Red-tailed Hawk 98, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker 29, Hairy Woodpecker 48, Pileated Woodpecker 52, Eastern Towhee 101, and Chipping Sparrow 9.

Fortunately, the lows were fewer: Northern Pintail 1 (t), Lesser Scaup 1 (t), Gray Catbird 1 (t), and Brown-headed Cowbird 12 (hurrah!). Second all-time lows were Ruddy Duck 2 (t), Wild Turkey 2 (t), Pied-billed Grebe 2 (t), American Coot 2 (t), and Brown Thrasher 2 (t).

Six species had been seen on two or fewer counts: Cackling Goose, Northern Goshawk, Horned Grebe, Merlin, Northern Saw-whet Owl, and Pine Warbler. Longtailed Duck had been seen on three prior counts. Two Evening Grosbeaks shared the spotlight. None had been tallied since 1991 when one had been seen. The only year when more than one was recorded was the first count in 1986, which boasted 67! The adult Gambel's Sparrow (a subspecies of the White-crowned) was a great find since it was new for the county (TFe).

With three known county nests, plus others in adjacent counties, Bald Eagle numbers have jumped each of the last three years. This year 17 eagles were counted in the vicinity of Brighton Dam (perched or in the air at once) (NM); seven others were established by time, plumage, etc. in other parts of the county. American Kestrels crept back into double digits to 10, but numbers since 2002 are still depressed. All woodpecker numbers were among the highest ever with several records. Carolina Chickadee and Tufted Titmouse numbers hit lows in 2004, but both have been up in each succeeding year (see totals in this issue and cumulative totals on the website under Seasonal Counts). A Gray Catbird and two Brown Thrashers, along with generally high numbers of Carolina Wrens, Eastern Bluebirds, Hermit Thrushes, American Robins, Cedar Waxwings, and Yellowrumped Warblers indicated ample fruit and mild weather. House Finch numbers were the highest in the last five years. There were no crow or blackbird roosts counted. There are always birds that got away. The county's only wild Mute

Swan died in 2007, so that species is no longer likely. Although this was the best year in recent memory for northern invasives, both Pine Siskin and Common Redpoll were missed, and sightings of an adult male Baltimore Oriole neatly bracketed count day. The chance for a new record will have to wait for another year.

This year for the first time we asked field observers to include the number of deer seen in the course of the day. The depressing total was 203, including about 50 at Rockburn Branch Park.

Many people contributed to the success of the day. In addition to the stalwart counters from this county, the 67 field observers, included birders from Anne Arundel, Baltimore, Carroll, Frederick, Montgomery, and Prince George's counties. We bid farewell to Susan Setterberg, a member and faithful counter; this was her final count with us before moving to California from New Jersey. Best wishes in retirement! Fifteen feeder watchers helped set some of the record highs, although more than one complained that the mild weather reduced the number of birds seen.

As co-compiler, Joe Byrnes did the preparatory work for the count. As usual, he handled the multiple details with precision and care; he is always looking for ways to improve the process. Area leaders arrange coverage, do follow-up if necessary, and compile area totals. Their

■he Howard County Bird Club's May Count, which is timed to coincide with the peak of the spring migration, will be held on May 10, 2008. For the count, Howard County is divided into the seven areas shown on the map. Each area has an Area Coordinator (name and phone number listed below) who communicates with the counters, assigns territories, and compiles area results. If you are a beginner, ask to be paired with a more experienced birder. Since the point is to tally every individual bird, extra eyes and ears are helpful. If you want to see a particular species, give me a call (410-418-8731) and I will try to place you in a location where you might have a good chance of seeing that bird.

At the end of the day, all of the

counters are invited to a tally rally at June Tveekrem's house. It is a great opportunity to relax, swap stories of the day, and learn what everyone else has seen. Please call June in advance (410-715-3979) and let her know how many are coming from your party and your choice of food or beverage to bring. Dinner will begin at 7 p.m. and the tally will start at 8 p.m. The completed checklist must be turned in to the area coordinators at the tally rally. If you cannot make it, be sure that your checklist is delivered or called in by 7 p.m. We will find out what rarities were seen and often go out the next day to try to relocate them.

Speaking of the checklist, we are no longer including it in

the newsletter. Since most were not being used, we decided to conserve paper. You can get a copy of it from the website or ask your area coordinator to email or mail you a copy.
