AUTUMN BIRD RECORDS: AUGUST 1 TO NOVEMBER 30, 2008

A utumn produced excellent species including Surf Scoter, White-winged Scoter, Ring-necked Pheasant, Golden Eagle, Baird's Sandpiper, Dunlin, Common Tern, Golden-winged Warbler, and Dickcissel, along with a Brewster's Warbler and a Lawrence's.

An early **Snow Goose** (ad.) appeared at the Marriottsville Pond 9/24 (**RR**). Forty **Canada Geese** were flying south high over Triadelphia Reservoir (TRIRS) 9/16, earlier than usual (**BHi**). The six

Cackling Geese at TRIRS 11/15 were shared by a field trip (KS+). Peak Tundra Swan flights appeared to be 11/17: Lake Elkhorn 60 (SN), Timberleigh 50 (DN), TRIRS 2 (KS), and 11/18 Duvall (flock heard) (KTf).

Fourteen **Wood Ducks** were at Gateway 11/17 (**JMcK**). TRIRS waterfowl included 10 **Gadwalls** 11/10 (**BHi**); the season's only **Blue-winged Teal** 8/30 (**NM**); **Northern Shovelers** 10/19

(Records continued from page 1) (NM,EH-5) to 11/4 (BHi-2), with 15 (a new high) 10/22-26 (BHi; NM); Greater Scaup 11/25 (**BHi,JCu**-2) to 11/29 (**BHi** -1); and two eleventh county records: a White-winged Scoter on the strangely early date of 8/26 (BHi, ph.) and two Surf Scoters 11/2 (**TFe**). The reservoir held a new high of 220 Buffleheads 11/10 (BHi). The record dated to 11/6/57! A Common Merganser there on 11/3 was the third earliest (**JHf**). The first **Ruddy Duck** appeared on Woodmark Lake 9/20 (**M&GMcC,RSm**).

Three **Wild Turkeys** walked the shore south of Nichols Cove (TRIRS) 10/24 (**NM**). A hen **Ring** -necked Pheasant, seen earlier in 2008 along Lime Kiln Rd, was spotted near the pond on 10/22 (KMr). A Common Loon at TRIRS 8/28 (**BHi**) to 8/30 (**NM**) was the county's first Aug. record. A Double-crested Cormorant at TRIRS 11/17 was a good Piedmont date (**JHf**); the largest flock totaled 48 over Thornbrook Rd 10/17 (JCu). The last Great Egret was at Centennial Park 11/2 (BO); the high was six at the Race Rd Wetlands 8/30 (**NM**). Did one im. Little Blue Heron wander the county for a month? Reports were from Wilde Lake 8/7 (ROr), Centennial 8/10 (MKw), Race Rd 8/30 (**NM**), and Elkhorn 9/5 (**SN**).

Bald Eagle highs were four at TRIRS 9/6 (NM) and three at Centennial 10/1 (MKw), with three reports on 11/29: Centennial (EHn), TRIRS (NM), and Elkhorn (SBw). In addition to nests at the reservoirs, a central Howard Co. pair produced a nestling in 2008 (fide WE). The first No. Har-

rier was spotted at Centennial 8/31 (MKw). Major Broadwinged Hawk flights either bypassed the county or escaped notice. The first sighting on 9/17 was also the peak: David Force Pk 104 (SBg), Bethany La/Md 99 7 (**JCu**), Sykes./River Rd 6 (**FLv**), and Manahan Dr 200 (BO-a.m.), 200+ (JOtt-p.m.). Barely a week later the last three were seen at the Middle Patuxent Environmental Area (MPEA) 9/25 (**JHf**). The county's eleventh Golden Eagle (and second latest) was observed from Brighton Dam 11/15 (KS,WE+). Merlins were noted in all four months beginning with a record-early fall migrant at TRIRS 8/14 (**EH,JS**). Possibly the same bird was seen in the area several more times into Sept. (**BHi**; **NM**). One at W. Friendship 10/19 (**ICu,LC**) and one on 11/28 at Woodmont Academy on Md 144 (JW) rounded out the last sightings. Half a dozen Peregrine Falcon reports ran from TRIRS 9/24 (**BHi**) to one over the Patapsco River, Hollofield Rd 11/18 (SE).

The only **Sora** was at Alpha Ridge Landfill 10/11 (**RC**). An **Am. Coot** at Elkhorn 8/19 was a new early record (**KS**); the high was three at Centennial 11/23 (**RR**).

Shorebirds were the expected species with two exceptions, both at Western RP: a **Dunlin** 10/24-25 (**JTv**, ph.) and a third record **Baird's Sandpiper** 8/17 (**G&BHi**, ph.). Unfortunately, the Baird's arrived at dusk and was gone by dawn. **Semipalmated Plovers** were seen at TRIRS during the week of 8/31 (**NM,EH,JS**) to 9/6 (**NM**). Browns Bridge produced the **Killdeer** peak of 61 on 8/7 (**NM**). At Western RP 8/1,

shorebird turnover was substantial from a.m. (**BHi**) to p.m. (**JHf**), underscoring the value of checking prime sites frequently during migration.

TRIRS produced terns and gulls. Bonaparte's Gulls were seen at least eight times 10/28--11/18 (BHi-1), with a high of 25+ on 11/21 (NM,KS). Although Caspian Terns were present 8/6 (BHi-7) to 9/13 (NM-2), totals were low. A seasonal highlight was the county's seventh Common Tern record on 9/5; an adult and an immature stayed the day (NM+, ph.). Autumn's only Forster's Tern was observed 9/4 (BHi; EH).

Cuckoos appeared in the Benson Branch watershed in early Aug. with Black-bills the first week and 8/12-13 and Yellow-bills 8/11 and 8/20 (M&GMcC). The first Common Nighthawk was spotted over Western RP 8/16 (BHi); the last at Jennings Chapel Rd 9/20 (TFe). Others included 14 at Hobbs Rd 9/1 and 10 on 9/7 (B&GHi), 16 at River Rd 9/8 (FLv), four at River Hill, W. Col. 8/28 (W&SE), three at W. Friendship 9/9 (LC), and one at Hallmark 8/19 (WEb).

Watching a **Chimney Swift** flock funnel into a chimney is thrilling. Two locations this fall were Savage Mill 9/17 (**SMu-**200+) and the old school in Clarksville 9/30 (**BO-**300+). People with hummer feeders are becoming alert to late migrants. A bird in River Hill banded 11/7 (**DHm,BPj**) proved to be a hatching-year female **Ruby-throated Hummingbird**. It was last seen 11/8, the latest verified

county record (BCt). Three Redheaded Woodpeckers along the
Patapsco River, east of Md 97 were
a nice find 9/20 (WE). Yellowbellied Sapsuckers showed up on
9/20 at Centennial (ML,PWf-1)
and Hipsley Mill Rd (TFe-1).

The first **Least Flycatcher** was seen and heard at Rockburn Branch Pk 9/1 (**JCu**). **Eastern** Kingbird numbers peaked on 8/21: Rockburn 38 (a new high; 22 between 7:30-7:40 a.m.) (**BO,EH**), Meadowbrook Park 2 (BO), and Centennial 1 (BO). Philadelphia **Vireo** reports were from 9/1 MPEA (**KS-1**) to three on 9/20: Rockburn (BO,EH-1), Dan./Old Fred. Rd (GB,CSt-1), MPEA (KS,JFn-1). Eighty Fish Crows were counted at the University of Maryland Central Farm (UMDCF) 10/18 (**NM**). Four **Common Ra**ven sightings were added to the 2008 total: Hobbs Rd 9/16 (**BHi**), TRIRS 9/24 (NM), Mt. Pleasant 10/4 (KS), and Brighton Dam 10/21 (**JHf**). One to five **Horned** Larks were at Western RP through the fall (BHi); three at MPEA 8/23, were at an unexpected location (BO). More than 100 Barn Swallows gathered over S. Trotter Rd 8/15 feasting on flying ants (W&SE).

Red-breasted Nuthatches were few: Brush Run, E. Col. 10/12 (JW -1) and Sykes./River Rd 10/16 (FLv-1). A Winter Wren in Swansfield, W. Col. 9/20 was early (MWr,KP). Two Marsh Wrens appeared at UMDCF 10/1 (BO,EH,JS) with three present 10/5 and 10/18 (BO+). Flocks of Eastern Bluebirds were present at Western RP 10/6 (BHi-55) and at Schooley MP 10/18 (NM-23). The only Gray-cheeked Thrush

report was from the MPEA 9/26 (JHf); his Swainson's Thrush there 10/28 was the third latest record. New late dates were a **Veery** in an Allview yard 10/25 (ES) and a Wood Thrush at Centennial 10/31 (JCu). Am. Robins dominated the fauna at MPEA 10/13 with 2,000+ present (**KS**). At least one **Gray Cathird** was seen through the period at Centennial (MKw+); another catbird was at Elkhorn Garden Plots 11/4 (JW,JHf). A lingering Brown Thrasher was in a Long Corner Rd vard 11/17 (**RSch**). The high American Pipit count was 11/2: Centennial (BO+-2) and Woodmont Academy (JW-15).

A female Golden-winged Warbler in the Sykes./River Rd area 9/5 was a seasonal highlight (**FLv**). Tennessee Warblers were reported from 9/7 at MPEA (**BO**-1) to 10/11 Elkhorn GP (**JW**-1). Good warbler counts at MPEA on 9/16 included **Chestnut-sided** 15 (new high), Magnolia 29, Blackburnian 2, and American Redstart 14 (BO,JS). Orangecrowned Warblers were reported at Schooley MP 9/28 (RB-1), Wynfield Dr 10/2 (NM-1), and Mt. Pleasant 10/4 (**KS+**-1-2). Cape Mays frequented Wynfield 9/29-10/16 with a high of four "frequently" (RC). The Yellowrumped Warbler high was 51 at MPEA 10/13 (**KS**). A **Yellow**throated Warbler at Waterford Farm 9/20 tied the second latest date (MW). The first eastern Palm showed up 9/28 at Western RP (**RC+**); the last was at Centennial 11/23 (ROr+). Western Palms were present at Elkhorn GP 9/24 (JW-1) to 10/20 (KGr-1) with a high of nine on 10/11 (**JW+**). Seldom reported in fall, a Cerulean Warbler was seen 9/20 (second

latest) at Dan./Old Fred. (GBt). The peak **Black-and-white War**bler movement was 9/1 with 14 at MPEA (**KS**) and one at Talbots Landing (R&JG). Mourning Warblers were seen from 9/9 at MPEA (BHi) until 10/17 at Elkhorn GP (JW), a new departure record (a first-year bird that had appeared 10/1). A first-year bird was also at the Patuxent Branch Trail 10/6 (SCI). The only Wilson's was at the landfill 9/20 (RC). Canada Warblers were widely reported from Patuxent BT 8/18 (**SCI**-1) to Sandchain, E. Col. 10/7, tying the 1969 departure date (**J&TDC**); one at Font Hill Wetland Pk 10/5 was the third latest (JTv). Both a Lawrence's Warbler (fifth record) at Schooley MP 9/7 (**RB**), and a **Brewster's** at No. Laurel 9/10 (**PWf**) were good finds. Rod Burley proved it isn't always necessary to bird at dawn. On the rainy afternoon of 9/28, he had 15 warbler species, including an Orange-crowned at Schooley MP.

The only **Am. Tree Sparrows** were at W. Friendship 11/23 (JCu-3). The high count of **Chipping** Sparrows was 22 at Rockburn BP 10/2 (**BO**). A **Vesper** was seen at the landfill 10/11 and 10/18(RC+). A Savannah on 8/22 at MPEA was the earliest fall date away from known nesting sites (JHf); the high was 250+ at UMDCF 10/26 (**BO+**). The latest Grasshopper Sparrow was spotted at the landfill 10/11 (RC,BO+). Disappointingly, for just the second time in a decade, no Nelson's Sharp-tailed was detected despite repeated searches. Unlike 2004, a lack of precipitation could not be blamed. Fox Spar-

As you know, the Howard County Bird Club provides indepth information on county birding. Because there is too much information available to include all of it in *The Goldfinch*, the club maintains a very detailed website, www.howardbirds.org.

This issue's featured section of the website is the species accounts. This is another section of the web revision of *Birding Howard County*, *Maryland*. It details each species that has been seen in the county. The species accounts are current through the last completed calendar year and often through the last completed season. Sightings that are under review by the Maryland/DC Records Committee are also included.

The description for each bird includes its abundance, the seasons that it appears in the county, and some locations where the bird has been seen in the county. Breeding information is also provided. If available, there are links to club's photo page for each bird as well as a link to the Breeding Bird Atlas page.

(Records continued from page 3) rows were slow to arrive with the two earliest reports 11/2: Allview (ES) and w. of Ellicott City (KHf,KD); the high was five at Meadowbrook 11/23 (JW). Song Sparrow numbers spiked by the middle of Oct. with 84 on 10/12 UMDCF (BO); on 10/18 Alpha Ridge Pk had 117 (RC,BO+) and Waterford 51 (BO,MW+). Lincoln's were well reported from 9/28 at Western RP (**RC,BO+-**2) to one at Elkhorn GP 10/20 (JW); the high was five at W. Friendship 10/12 (JCu,BO+). A Whitethroated Sparrow at MPEA 9/1 set a new arrival date (KS).

Up to two **Dickcissels** were present 10/18-10/26 at UMDCF (**BO+**). The last **Bobolink** was seen at UMDCF 10/5 (**BO+**). The **Eastern Meadowlark** high was 11 at the landfill 10/11 (**RC**). The only **Rusty Blackbird** report came from Savage Junc. Bus. Pk 10/15-16 (**TMr-**3). A mixed flock of 3,000 blackbirds was present at Race Rd 10/21 (**NM**). **Purple Finches** appeared at Elkhorn GP 10/2 (**JHf-**1); there were 15 re-

ports from 10 locations. Two **Pine Siskins** showed up at Elkhorn GP 10/20 (**KGr**); the high of 20 was at Wynfield 11/9 (**RC**), with a total of eight reports from seven locations. **Am. Goldfinches** had a banner year judging from the 80+counted at Wynfield 11/21 (**RC**) and 225 at Mt. Pleasant (175 in one flock) 11/23 (**BO**).

HOWARD COUNTY ODONATE SURVEY 2008

A new county dragonfly was added in 2008. The Mocha Emerald (*Somatochlora linearis*) was spotted along an intermittent stream at North Laurel Park, August 31, 2008 (Bob & Jo Solem). That addition brings the county list to 95 species after 13 years.

The third annual Howard County Dragonfly Count, coordinated by June Tveekrem, was held on August 23. Twenty-three participants tallied 38 species. Complete details have been previously published. The date for this year's count is July 25, 2009.

Extensions were recorded for the following species: Twin-spotted

Spiketail 4/26 (JTv), Stream Cruiser 4/18 (Wes Earp), Barwinged Skimmer 5/30 (Ken Clayton), and Wandering Glider 11/6 (JTv). The spiketail was a new species for the Middle Patuxent Environmental Area bringing that list to 51. Skimming Bluet (B&JS) and Blue Corporal (Jim Wilkinson) were added to Western Regional Park's list bringing it to 33.
