SUMMER BIRD RECORDS: JUNE 1 – JULY 31, 2010 BY JOANNE SOLEM

S ummer normally produces few notable birds. This year Little Blue Heron was the best. Both night-herons, Black-billed Cuckoo, Red-headed Woodpecker, Cerulean Warbler, and Prothonotary Warbler were additional highlights.

Patuxent River State Park is a **Wild Turkey** stronghold. Three reports this season included 14 (2 f. and ~12 chicks) along Hipsley Mill Rd 6/18 (**CSt,DHv**), three young north of Howard Chapel Rd 6/30 (**JHf,JS+**), and three young south of Hipsley Mill Rd 7/15 (**SBg**).

Two Little Blue Herons flew over Centennial 7/29 (**BO**), the

only ones recorded so far in 2010. Black-crowned Night-Herons continued regularly at Wilde Lake with a high of three (2 ad.) 7/14 (JCu). Yellow-crowned Night-Herons visited Lake Elkhorn intermittently (MSt; SN). The only Osprey reports came from Centennial 6/13, 7/11, 7/17 (MKw).

Flocking **Killdeer** reached a modest peak of 28 at Browns Bridge 7/31 (**BHi**). The first **Lesser Yellowlegs** arrived on 7/31 with one at Tarbay Dr (**KS**) and one at Fulton Pond (**BHi**). **Solitary, Spotted**, and **Least Sandpipers** dropped in at Browns Bridge and *(Records continued on page 2)*

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(*Records continued from page 1*) Tarbay Dr 7/11 (**JHf**). The high count of Leasts was 21 at Browns Bridge 7/31 (**BHi**). An **American Woodcock** flushed from a trail south of Hipsley Mill Rd 7/2 (**CSt**).

A lone **Ring-billed Gull** was spotted over Dobbin Rd 7/13 (**JHf**). **Black-billed Cuckoos** were reported twice: Cavey La, Woodstock 6/8 (**RRf**) and Annapolis Rock, PRSP 7/3 (**DCm**). **Yellowbilled Cuckoos** were well reported with 10 observers noting birds at eight locations.

Eastern Screech-Owls turned up at W. Friendship 7/29 (LCg) and Duvall Rd 7/31 (K&DTf). Barred Owls were reported from Hipsley Mill Rd 6/18 (CSt,DHv) and 7/15 (SBg); Stone Hill Dr 6/24 (KLz-1 ad., 2 fl.); and Elkhorn throughout July (SN-2). A pair of Chimney Swifts nested in Randle's chimney at Braeburn 7/12 (**ESu, JRn**-2+). The Ruby-throated Hummingbird nest at Eden Brook was last observed (and photographed) 6/2with a female and one nestling (**BO**). Of the four hummers at Thornbrook Rd 7/11, one was an adult male (JCu). A Red-headed Woodpecker again seen at a farm on St. Michaels Rd 7/28 (W&SE+) raised hopes that they had nested in the vicinity.

Fifteen Acadian Flycatchers were reported in the River Rd/Sykesville section of PVSP 6/6 (FLv). Yellow-throated Vireos were noted at MPEA (BO), Howard Chapel Rd (KS), and Browns Bridge (MBw). Warbling Vireos were present at Centennial (MKw) and at Oakland Mills Rd (JW). Twentyfour Red-eyed Vireos were tallied at Hipsley Mill Rd 6/17 (JHf,JS+).

A **Common Raven** was spotted at I-95/MD216 on 6/3 (**TFe**). One Horned Lark was present at A.E. Mullinix Rd 6/23 (JW). In addition to the usual dam and bridge nesting sites, Cliff Swallows were reported from Fulton Pond 6/7 (JHf -2), US29/Middle Patuxent River (a former nesting location) 6/13(JW-1), and Johns Hopkins APL 6/24 (NM-1). At Browns Bridge, a nesting location used several decades ago, four were seen at a minimum of two nests 7/11 (**JHf**). Nesting Barn Swallows at Centennial peaked at 73 on 6/26 (MKw). A Carolina Wren was feeding a fledging Brown-headed Cowbird at Allview 6/27 (ESu).

Veery reports were more numerous than usual. The high was at Hipsley Mill Rd, PRSP where seven were recorded 6/27 (KS) and five on 7/5 (SBg); the River Rd/Sykesville section of PVSP had four on 6/6 (FLv); and two were still singing along the South Wind Trail at MPEA 7/5 (J&RS, M&GMcC). Eight Wood Thrushes were counted south of Hipsley Mill Rd 6/17 (JS,JHf+).

Blue-winged Warblers were present during the nesting season at both River Rd/Sykesville 6/6 (FLv) and Annapolis Rock Rd 6/18 (CSt,DHv). Yellow Warblers at Centennial dropped from five on 6/13 to two on 7/31(MKw). Two Pine Warblers were at Annapolis Rock 6/30 (JHf). A Prairie Warbler was at the same location on 6/18 (CSt,DHv). Cerulean Warblers are a choice nesting species. They were reported from Henryton 6/2 (**BO,EH**-1) and south of Hipsley Mill Rd from 6/17 (**JHf,JS+-**1) to 7/3 (**KS**-1). Black-and-white Warblers were noted at Henryton 6/2 (BO,EH-

1) and at Big Branch 6/7(JS,ROr,GMcC-1). American Redstarts were widely repoted: Henryton 6/2 (**BO,EH**-1), Avalon, PVSP 6/4 and 6/25 (JS, **G&McC,ROr**), as well as three locations in PRSP with a high of eight south of Hipsley Mill Rd 6/17 (JS,JHf+). A singing Prothonotary Warbler lingered at Pigtail until 6/3 with no evidence of nesting (**JCu**). On 6/6, 16 **Ovenbirds** and 11 Louisiana Waterthrushes (new high) were counted at River Rd/Sykesville, PVSP (FLv). Hooded Warblers have hung on in two sections of PRSP: 6/17 Hipsley Mill Rd and 6/30 Howard Chapel Rd (**JHf,JS**+).

Grasshopper Sparrows are confined almost exclusively to the northwestern part of the county. They were reported from A.E. Mullinix Rd 6/23 (**JW**-1), Carrs Mill Rd across from Western Regional Park 7/26 (**KS**-1), and Old Frederick Rd/Underwood Rd 7/18 (**JW**-1). A **Blue Grosbeak** was spotted at Meadowbrook 6/28 (**JW**). An **Eastern Meadowlark** was seen at Carrs Mill Rd 6/26 (**KS**).

Exotics: Two **Black Swans** continued at a pond south of MD144/ fairgrounds 7/7 (**JCu**).

Spring Additions: Turkey Vultures nested in a barn along the Patapsco River west of MD94 on 5/5 (**BHi**). A **Rusty Blackbird** was reported from So. Trotter Rd 5/5 (**MW**).



SUMMARY OF THE 2010 HOWARD COUNTY FALL COUNT BY MIKE MCCLURE AND CHUCK STIRRAT

he seventeenth annual Howard County Fall Count was conducted on Sept. 18, 2010. All field counters agreed it was a slow day of birding. That said, this turned out to be one of our better counts. A new high [140 versus 136] was set for the number of species observed. Comparison totals for the prior 16 years are as follows: high, 136 on 9/19/1998; low 108 on 9/18/2004; average, 125 species. This new high, 140 species, includes a Traill's Flycatcher which is either an Alder or a Willow Flycatcher and can only be separated by vocalization. Since there were no Alder or Willow Flycatchers reported, the Traill's must be one of the two and hence, is included. Highlights were first-ever Common Merganser and Baird's Sandpiper, and second time occurrences of Wild Turkey, American Golden-Plover, Western Sandpiper, Hermit Thrush, and Purple Finch. The extensive mudflats at Cattail Creek added many more shorebirds than on prior counts.


The number of participants and parties (59 and 31) was split compared to last year's (52 and 34) with seven additional participants but three fewer parties. The participants provided 201 hours of field counting time. The mileage was 476 compared to the average of 380 miles. The total of individual birds tallied to 16,052 which is below the average. Comparisons to prior years: high, 26,651 on 9/17/1994; low, 9,293 on 9/18/2004; average, 16,934 birds. Finally, 23 warbler species were identified (high, 30; low, 13; average, 24 species) with 448 individual warblers sighted (high, 1004; low, 130; average, 446 individuals).

Fall Count has been adversely affected by the weather on eight occa-

sions (50% of the time). These weather events ranged from severe drought, to extensive rainfall, to unseasonably hot and humid conditions, to comfortable temperature and humidity accompanied by high winds for the day. Saturday's temperature started in the low 50's at 6:00 a.m. under light cloud cover, rising to 77° in late afternoon with lingering light cloud cover. The humidity was comfortable (dew point: 48° at 6:00 a.m. rising to 58° by 6:00 p.m.). Winds were very light throughout the day. In spite of the delightful weather, counters generally complained about the lack of birds. This problem is reflected in the data from the 17 years of Fall Counts as shown on the graphics for the total number of individual birds and warblers observed countywide.

The accompanying table presents the count data. There were 18 species for which there was only one bird sighted countywide and 14 species for which there were only two birds sighted countywide. Species showing moderately high numbers (>500) are Canada Goose, 793; Broad-winged Hawk, 896; Rock Pigeon, 731; Blue Jay, 1,094; crows [American+Fish +species], 2018; American Robin, 909; Gray Catbird, 557; European Starling, 943, Northern Cardinal 646; and American Goldfinch, 664.

Plan now to join us on a future seasonal count and if possible attend the tally as well. The eighteenth annual Fall Count will be held on Saturday, September 17, 2011.
