WINTER BIRD RECORDS: DECEMBER 1, 2010 – FEBRUARY 28, 2011 BY JOANNE SOLEM

Headline species this season were Greater White-fronted Goose, Black-capped Chickadee, Lapland Longspur, Brewer's Blackbird, White-winged Crossbill, and Common Redpoll. Although much lower total snowfall this winter than last was an advantage for observers, ice-covered ponds and reservoirs reduced waterfowl numbers for much of January and February.

A Greater White-fronted Goose (5th record) appeared 12/23 at the Brighton Dam Rd quarry (JHf). Fortunately, it re-appeared on Daisy Rd 1/7 (JSz), where it was seen intermittently until 1/22 (JHb+). A total of four different Snow Geese were tracked (JCu; JFr; NM-2). Cackling Geese were reported from seven different locations. A banded Canada Goose on Daisy Rd 1/24 had been banded in Greenland, July 2009 (NM). One or two Gadwalls were noted at Lake Elkhorn 12/1 (**JHf**) to 2/26 (SN); the high American Wigeon count was 23 at a farm on Daisy Rd 1/24 (NM); 100 Mallards gathered at Pigtail 12/10 (CSt); Waterford hosted nine Northern Shovelers 12/18 and one 2/5 (**MW**), three **Northern** Pintails were spotted at a Daisy Rd farm 1/21 (BCe), and Redheads reached a high of 21 at Centennial 2/4 (KDy). Greater Scaup were noted at the quarry (JHf), BRDAM (KS), Centennial (KS), Rocky Gorge Dam (RBy+), and Elkhorn (DCm). Thirty Longtailed Ducks appeared at TRIRS 12/7 (BHi, DCm); one female was spotted at the quarry 1/13(BHi; m.obs.). Common Goldeneves were scarce with one male (JHf), (later two BHi, DCm) at TRIRS 12/7. The peak count of 78 Hooded Mergansers came from (Records continued on page 2)

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(*Records continued from page 1*) Pigtail 12/10 (**CSt**). Common Merganser numbers at TRIRS swelled from 13 on 12/9 (**BHi**) to 1,800+ by 12/26 (**NM**), with five female **Red-breasted Mergansers** in that large flock (**NM**). When lakes and reservoir froze, just two Common Mergs were tallied countywide 2/5 (**JS, KKx**-1; **ESu, SN-**1), but by 2/25, after a thaw, 1,000 were again present at BRDAM (**JS**).

Wild Turkeys are doing well with reports from four locations (SDw, BHi, FLv, PWf). The high was 24 in mid-January at property on Carrs Mill Rd (SDw).

Bald Eagles continue to be widely reported. Highs in the vicinity of BRDAM were 16 on 12/26 (**NM**) and 15 on 2/23 (**JHf**). **Merlins** made an unusual showing this winter with a high of six on 2/5 (**HCMC**). **Peregrine Falcons** were spotted at UMDCF 12/18 (**WE, M&GMcC**) and at Roxbury Mill Rd 2/5 (**JCu**).

American Coot numbers built to eight by 2/28 at Centennial (KS). Killdeer reports were few. On 12/18, a Wilson's Snipe was at UMDCF (S&WE, G&MMcC) as well as 2/5 (MMcC, RSm); also, Florence Rd/Shaffers Mill Rd 2/5 (J&MBr-2), and Waverly Pond 2/27 (RRf-1). An American Woodcock was a surprise at Pigtail 12/18 (MW). It was the last reported until spring migrants arrived at MPEA 2/17 (DCm-2) and at River Rd/Sykesville 2/18 (FLv-4).

Bonaparte's Gull migration at TRIRS extended well into December with a high of 27 on 12/14 (**JHf**). A banded **Ring-billed Gull** seen at the Long Gate Shopping Center 2/12 had been banded in Massachusetts 10/29/10 (**JGu**). A **Great Black-backed Gull** waited until 2/23 to make a winter appearance at TRIRS, with three there 2/24 (both **JHf**).

Two Eastern Screech-Owls (one red) roosted intermittently in nest boxes at Talbots Landing (**R&** JGu). A Northern Saw-whet Owl and a Long-eared Owl were detected at Annapolis Rock Rd 1/20 (JSh, JCu+), again on 1/25 (DCm, RGb), but not after that. At least two Red-headed Woodpeckers were spotted 2/5 at a farm on St. Michaels Rd (W&SE).

Because **Black-capped Chickadees** invade infrequently and present identification problems, birders appreciated their widespread appearance this winter. A bird arrived at a Thornbrook Rd feeder 11/2 and was still present 2/28. It was well-photographed and seen by many, thanks to **Jeff Culler's** hospitality. Others were at Dunloggin 1/1 (**KS**), Annapolis Rock Rd 1/21 (**EBy, JSz**-4), Shaffersville Rd 1/21 (**KS, DCm**) (again 1/30 **EBy, JSz, NSb**), and Font Hill Dr/El Dee Dr 2/20 (**JW**).

Common Ravens continue to wander into the county with reports at Rocky Gorge Dam 12/18 (**RBy+**-2), River Rd/Sykesville 12/18 (**FLv**-1), US29/Rivers Edge Rd 1/13 (**JHf**-1), Mt. Pleasant 1/24 (**RGb**-1), and Timberleigh 2/17 (**DNg**-2). A report on 1/13 lacked details. **Horned Larks** were consistent at Western Regional Park with a high of 43 on 1/8 (**M'OS**). The largest flock was in fields along Underwood Rd where the peak was 150 on 1/29 (**JHf**)⁻a count which had not been reached since 2/12/04 when 150+ were tallied at the same site (**RC**). Although some **Red-breasted Nuthatches** moved in this winter, they were few and locations inconsistent.

The last House Wren of 2010 was seen at Fulton 12/18 (DHm). Wintering American Robins appeared in numbers at Centennial Pk 1/19 (BO-210) and at Dunloggin 2/20 (KS-200). American Pipits were scarce except for one flock of 50 on 1/8 along Underwood Rd (CSt, JCu). Seven flocks of Cedar Waxwings numbering 50+ were reported (W&SE, MKw, FLv, ESu, MW-2, JW).

A wintering **Pine Warbler** appeared at a suet feeder at Paul Mill Rd 1/27 (**PWf**); another was photographed at Font Hill Dr/ Carrigan Dr 2/9 (**JCu**). The last **Common Yellowthroat** of the year was spotted 12/18 at UMDCF (**WE**).

American Tree Sparrows were most consistent at Mt. Pleasant where the high was nine on 1/17(JW), at Schooley Mill Park where four were tallied on 2/26-an eight sparrow day there (NM), and at River Rd, Sykesville (FLv-1-2). It was a good winter for Chipping Sparrows with highs of four at both Schooley 12/4 and Font Hill Wetlands Park 2/11 (both **JW**); other reports: RC, JHf, JMcK, **BO**. Oddly, in the Howard Co. areas of the Triadelphia Count circle on 12/18, 12 lingering Chippies eclipsed the eight Field Sparrows reported. Most other sparrow numbers were unremarkable. A Lapland Longspur is a choice county bird. Five (a new high, 13th record) were discovered at the

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(*Records continued from page 2*) edge of snowbanks along Underwood Rd on 1/29 (**JHf**). Many people were able to see at least one among the numerous Horned Larks and Savannah Sparrows. The same day two were reported nearby from Old Frederick Rd (**JW**), but are being considered part of the five. One longspur was also logged at Alpha Ridge Landfill 2/5 (**RC**).

A female **Northern Cardinal** that exhibited partial albinism (white patches on the neck and head) was again at Martin Rd, w. Col. as it has been each winter from 2008 to the present (**JHf**).

Rusty Blackbirds may be a declining species, but this season a flock of up to 60 (1/29) (**JHf**) spent several months in the wetlands and silage pit at Florence Rd near Shaffersville Rd (m.obs.). They were also seen at Manahan Dr 1/29 (**BO**-1), Martin Rd, w. Col. 2/2 (**JHf**-1), Allview 2/10 (**JMcK**-1), and Cavey La 2/23 (**RRf**-3). A female **Brewer's Blackbird** (4th record) was spotted 12/23 at a feeder in a yard adjacent to Meadowbrook Park (**JW**).

Winter irruptives included small numbers of Purple Finches in early winter, and widespread, but inconsistent, Pine Siskins, mostly fewer than 10. Non-feeder sightings came from Schooley 12/18(NM-1) and the vicinity of Font Hill Dr/Carrigan Dr where up to 10 visited spruce cones 1/22through Feb. (JW; m.obs.) One White-winged Crossbill flew over Brush Run, e. Col. 12/8 (**JW**), and a Common Redpoll visited a feeder in Sykesville 2/28 (SHs). (Last previous record 2/23/07, FP)

HOWARD COUNTY MIDWINTER COUNT By Joe Hanfman

A n overcast day with light rain, fog, wind, and temperatures from 32° – 36° F made for a tough day of birding. The ponds were frozen, fields covered in snow, rivers open, and some ice where snow was compacted. The weather contributed to the second lowest species count of 83 and the lowest individual number of birds at 19,648.

There was one new species added to the midwinter count, a Blackcapped Chickadee coming to a feeder in Ellicott City. Only the second Lapland Longspur in 25 years was found. An all-time high count for Merlin was 6, breaking the previous record of 2.


Fourteen new lows were set or tied previous lows: American Wigeon 2, Common Merganser 2, Black Vulture 13, Turkey Vulture 39, Mourning Dove 504, Belted Kingfisher 5, Downy Woodpecker 109, Northern Mockingbird 101, European Starling 2443, Field Sparrow 26, White-throated Sparrow 701, Northern Cardinal 601, Brownheaded Cowbird 12, and House Finch 166.

The birds that have been seen on more than half of the counts but missed this year were Snow Goose, Tundra Swan, Wood Duck, Northern Pintail, Lesser Scaup, Bufflehead, Ruddy Duck, Pied-billed Grebe, Northern Harrier, Great Black-backed Gull, Eastern Screech-Owl, Eastern Phoebe, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Gray Catbird, Brown Thrasher, and Purple Finch. Many people contributed to the success of the day: 74 observers spent 159.2 hours and covered 68.2 miles on foot and 498 miles by car; another 21.7 hours were spent watching feeders — plus 4 additional stationary hours.

As co-compiler, Joe Byrnes did the preparatory work for the count. As usual, he handled multiple details with precision and care. Chuck Stirrat summarized the area worksheets and provided field and feeder checklists. Area leaders arranged coverage, did follow-up if necessary, and compiled area totals. Their names are in boldface below (anyone who counted in more than one area or also at a feeder is listed just once). This year we welcomed Michele Wright as leader of Area 5. Once again we thank Karen and Jeff Culler for generously serving as hosts for the tally and welcoming us to their home.

Land permission from Howard County Dept. of Recreation and Parks, Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission, and many private property owners assure good coverage—we are extremely grateful.

ANNUAL LIST FOR THE COUNTY BY WARD EBERT

T wo thousand ten was another strong year, tying 1994 for second place with a count of 236 species behind last year's record 241. This includes the discovery of a deceased Barn Owl (included upon inspection and determination that this was indeed a county bird). Helping the total were reports of a number of shorebirds not commonly found in the county; these included American Golden-Plover, American Avocet, Upland Sandpiper, Ruddy Turnstone, Western Sandpiper, Baird's Sandpiper, Stilt Sandpiper, Short-billed Dowitcher, and Red Phalarope. Other sightings of note include Glossy Ibis, Lesser Black-backed Gull, Shorteared Owl, Alder Flycatcher, Black -capped Chickadee, and Brewer's Blackbird. A probable Bicknell's Thrush did not make the list, but certainly adds to the sense of success in the hunt for rarities.

Sadly missing was the formerly common Northern Bobwhite which had been missed in only one previous year of the last 30. Look for the complete list on our website, with history dating back to 1979. Thanks and congratulations to all those who spent many hours scouring the county and gathering this data.

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(Field Trips continued from page 6) difficult walking with steep trails, waist high wet vegetation, and muddy trails, so wear appropriate footwear. Hand clippers can be valuable to cut the multiflora rose canes which are difficult to avoid. No facilities. 

The first place winner will receive a backpack containing a pair of Ea-



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MAY COUNT IS SATURDAY, MAY 14, 2011 By Kevin Heffernan

he Howard County Bird Club holds three bird counts every year: Fall Count, Midwinter Count, and May Count. The May Count, which is timed to coincide with the peak of the spring migration, is held on the second Saturday in May. This year it is on May 14th, the latest date it can be. This is by far the most exciting time of year for birding. The spring migrants are passing through on their way north. The summer residents are back and some of the winter migrants are still hanging around. This is the time of year when you will see or hear the largest number of species. Over the last 10 years across the county, we have tallied an average of 147 species during the May Count.

For the count, Howard County is divided up into the seven areas shown on the map. Each area has an Area Coordinator (name and phone number listed below) who communicates with the counters, assigns territories, and compiles area results. If you are a beginner, ask to be paired with a more experienced birder. Since the point is to tally every individual bird, extra eyes and ears are helpful. If you want to see a particular species, give me a call (410-418-8731) and I will try to place you in a location where you might have a good chance of seeing that bird.
