WINTER BIRD RECORDS: DECEMBER 1, 2012 – FEBRUARY 28, 2013

A winter with more rain than snow was highlighted by a <u>Great Egret</u>, unusual gulls, a <u>Louisiana Waterthrush</u>, a wintering <u>Summer Tanager</u>, and numerous boreal species.

Snow Geese were few. A white adult and an immature were reported from a variety of locations from 12/2 at Sawmill Rd (**JHf**) to 1/26 at the quarry pond, Springdale Dr (**RRf**, **HFk**, **MRg**). Five **Cackling Geese** at the large Lime Kiln pond 12/15 (**NM**) were the high for the season. A few **Tundra Swans** heard in the fog at Western Regional 12/17 were a new species for the park (**KTf**).

Gadwalls peaked at 10 at Fox Chase 2/15 (**BO**). **American Wigeon** numbers at ponds on Daisy Rd rose from 13 on 12/13 (**KTf**) to 33 on 1/26 (**RRf**, **HFk**, **MRg**). The 100 **American Black Ducks** at Browns Bridge 1/5 (**MKw**) were a fine count. Three **Blue-winged Teal** at W. Friendship Pk 2/2 were among the earliest February records (**JCu**, **JHf**, **DCm**). **Northern Shovelers** are infrequent visitors, but this season they were spotted at three sites with a high of five at Race Rd wetlands 1/13 (**KS**) and 2/14 (**HPt**, **KDy**). Two male **Northern Pintails** stopped at Centennial 1/14 (**BO+**); two (one female) at Warfields Pond Pk 2/2 were a new species for the park (**JCu**, **DCm**). A few **Redheads** appeared. One male, photographed at Browns Bridge 1/16 (**HPt**), spent a week in a flock of **Ring-**

necked Ducks that peaked at 226 on 1/22 (KS). Greater Scaup were spotted at five locations from 12/12 at Gateway (DCm+-1) to 2/8 at Lake Kittamaqundi (DCm-2). Common Goldeneyes are never "common" locally. This season two dropped in at Centennial 1/25 (BO); last seen 1/26 (RRf, HFk, MRg). Hooded Mergansers peaked at 30 at Lake Elkhorn on 2/22 (SN). Common Mergansers again gathered in impressive numbers at Triadelphia Reservoir. More than 2,000 (new high) were counted on 1/6 based on multiple photos (MKw). A maximum of four Red-breasted Mergansers were at Brighton Dam on 1/17 (JHf).

Wild Turkeys continue to turn up consistently, mostly in the west. One at Scotts Cove, Duckett Reservoir 12/31 was at an unusual location (**KKx**). A nest with broken eggshells (halves and membranes) under a few briars in pine woods at Annapolis Rock 2/11 was the first recorded in the county (**JSh**). Best guess was that it was an unusually late 2012 nest.

Horned Grebes are not always present in winter. This year they appeared at four locations with a high of three at Lake Elkhorn and one at Gateway on 2/23 (**RRf, HFk, MRg**). A decade ago **Double-crested Cormorants** were almost unknown in winter. This year at least one was noted at four sites; three spent much of Jan. at Lake Kittamaqundi (**DCm**). A **Great Egret** at Race Rd 1/14 set a new late date for the county (**MO'S**) [12/27/03 S. Neri, M. Stewart+].

Bald Eagles were widely reported. The pair continued at the new nest at the Univ. of Md Central Farm (**m.obs**.). The only **American Coots** noted were two at the quarry pond 2/22 (**DCm**+). Peak **Wilson's Snipe** numbers were four at ALRGL 1/12 (**RCu**+). Uncharacteristically, **American Woodcock** were reported all winter, even on a number of Jan. evenings! Low temperatures were no deterrent as six were courting at a chilly 36°F at Hipsley Mill Rd on 1/15 (**RRf**).

Gulls were among the stars of the season. At least 65 **Bonaparte's Gulls** at Lake Kittamaqundi 1/22 were a surprise (**DCm**; **m. obs**.). A winter flock of that size had not been seen in the county for more than 20 years. Birders have endured a lack of unusual gull species since 1997, the last year Alpha Ridge was an active landfill. Scattered records since then have been few and inconsistent. This winter a site near the county line usually visited on seasonal counts (**ESu**) provided excellent gulls for a month. On 1/27, while scouting for HCMC, seven **Great Black-backed Gulls** were spotted in a mixed flock on a fenced parking lot adjacent to a small pond (**KS**). A few hundred yards away an Anne Arundel waste transfer facility offered gulls a bountiful supply of food. The location appeared to have great potential since a different mix of gulls arrived each morning from roost sites near the Bay. Unfortunately, security issues arose almost immediately. Fortunately, Russ Ruffing obtained permission for birders to access a viewing area. From 1/27-2/28, the following gulls were identified: **Iceland** (second-cycle; 12th record; **JHf+**), **Lesser Black-backed** (three: one first-cycle and two different third-cycle birds; **JHf; NM+**), **Glaucous** (near adult; 15th; **BBg, MBc+**), and **Great Black-backed** with a high of 64 on 1/30 (**NM, JHf+**). Kudos to Joe Hanfman for identifying many of the gulls, as well as thanks to the many photographers.

At Patuxent River State Pk, a **Long-eared Owl** was seen at dusk 12/13 (**DCm**), 1/26 (**RRf, HFk**, **MRg**), and on a few other dates, while a **Northern Saw-whet** was noted the evening of 1/27 (**JHf**+). In the course of the winter, dozens of pellets were found—some at obvious roosts—but no more than one of either species was ever seen (**JSh**+). On 2/5, rehabilitator Judy Holzman was called to a house near Worthington Elem. School where she found a saw-whet perched on a porch. When the bird was approached, it flew to a nearby conifer so no intervention was required. A **Short-eared Owl** (10th) was present at ALRGL 1/8 (**RCu**).

As has been usual for a decade, wintering American Kestrels were few (HCMC - 2). On the other hand, Merlins were reported from eight locations with three on HCMC (NM; JSh+; M&GMcC, RSm). A Peregrine Falcon was reported carrying a Common Grackle at Fox Chase 12/12 (BO); singles were at Jessup 2/5 (KS, JHf), and at Brighton Dam 2/24 (MKw).

Sightings of **Common Ravens** at Annapolis Rock ranged from 1/4 (**DCm**-1) to 2/16 (**JSh**+-2); others were spotted at Jessup 2/5 (**JHf**-1) and at the power lines on Gorman Rd 2/7 (**WE**-2). **Black-capped Chickadees**, rare winter visitors, were verified at two locations: Crest Lawn 12/1 (**BHb**+) and Sebring where a bird moved between Sebring Dr 12/7 (**JHf**+) and Martin Rd (two streets away) 1/1 (**JHf**). **Red-breasted Nuthatches** were widely present (mostly one or two) with highs of seven at Crest Lawn 12/1 (**KS**) and four at Gateway 2/9 (**JW**).

The season's only **House Wren** was spotted along the Little Patuxent River at Old Frederick Rd 1/13 (**PWf**). At MPEA on 2/25, a House Wren nest with three eggs was found in a nesting box (**SKd**, **JCf**). The nest had been built and eggs laid after the box was cleaned on 8/19/12, establishing a record late egg date (**SKd**). **Ruby-crowned Kinglets** were more scarce than usual; HCMC tallied one (**WEb**, **TSt**). Two **Brown Thrashers** turned

up on HCMC: Columbia Hills (**BLd**) and MPEA (**MRg**). The high count of **Amercan Pipits** was 95 at Underwood Rd 12/31 (**JHf**).

Warblers of special interest included a Louisiana Waterthrush at Font Hill Wetland Pk on the state record early date of 2/16 (also 2/26) (JW, ph.). Interestingly, three of the four state early records for this species are from this county (**RR**). A Nashville Warbler at Crest Lawn 12/6 established a new county late date (**MBw**+) [11/23/2005 R. Cullison]. A western **Palm** at Western Reg. 12/8 was just the second Dec. record (**DCm**).

Ten American Tree Sparrows were present at Mt. Pleasant 12/19 (BO) and at Fox Chase 1/11 (BO). Normally uncommon in winter, Chipping Sparrows were noted at a minimum of five locations with highs of 12 at Cavey La 12/12 (RRf) and eight at Wynfield Dr ~12/25 (RCu). Both observers mentioned an association of this species with Dark-eyed Juncos. The Vesper at Fox Chase 12/23 (BO, ROr) was a new late date [11/12/01 H. Zeichner, M. Chestem]. Wintering Savannahs reached 65 (55 in one flock) at ALRGL 1/12 (RCu+). A 10-sparrow day was notched countywide on 2/23 (RRf, HFk, MRg), while nine species were counted at Mt. Pleasant 2/22 (BO). (Juncos, but not towhees were included.)

A female **Summer Tanager** first appeared at a Sebring Dr feeder on the bizarre date of 11/24 (**BDn**, ph.). In early December, when it was brought to the attention of local birders, they flocked by the dozens to see this winter rarity—a state late bird still present in early March! She also visited feeders at nearby Martin Rd (**JHf**).

A flock of 26 Eastern Meadowlarks at ALRGL 2/2 was the largest in 15 years (RCu). Although few Rusty Blackbirds were reported, 35 on Florence Rd 1/26 was a nice count (RRf, HFk, MRg).

Crossbills were highlights of the season. **Reds** were reported at five locations, almost all in Dec. The first was a male at Beaverbrook 12/1 (**ROr-1**); the high was a flock of 25 that flew across Duckett Reservoir on 12/15 (**RBy, DRh**). Two at MPEA dropped to a puddle at the feet of surprised observers on 2/10 (**M&CRg**). **White-winged Crossbills** were more frequently reported. Crest Lawn produced the most consistent sightings from 12/1 (**JHf**+-7), with a high count of 35 in two flocks 1/10 (**DCm**). A second productive area was the vicinity of Barrel House Rd, N. Laurel 1/7 (**JW**-25); the high was 44 on 1/10 (**HPt, KDy**). In addition to utilizing various conifers, sweetgum fruit proved attractive as observed on N. Ridge Rd 2/7 (**S&DBg**, ph.). Winter's lone **Com-** **mon Redpoll** was spotted on Wildflower Terr, Wilde Lake 12/22 (**JW**). In contrast, **Pine Siskins** visited numerous feeders, but numbers were much lower than those in late Oct. Cavey La notched a winter high of 25 on 12/12 (**RRf**).

HOWARD COUNTY MIDWINTER COUNT, FEBRUARY 2, 2013

A cold and overcast day with temperatures $12 - 30^{\circ}$ F, but at least the snow held off until the evening. The ponds were iced over in the morning and 75% frozen in the afternoon; the rivers were open. We recorded 94 species which is five above the average of the last 26 years. The total number of individual birds was 43,197 which is 11,898 below the average, but the highest total since 2007.

There was one new species added to the midwinter count, a female Summer Tanager coming to a feeder south of Columbia. Only the second White-winged Crossbill in 27 years was found. Blue-winged Teal were found for only the third time. Greater Scaup and Double-crested Cormorant were found for only the fourth time.

All-time high counts were recorded for Canada Goose 13,961, Blue-winged Teal 3, Hooded Merganser 87, Winter Wren 30, Savannah Sparrow 133, and Dark-eyed Junco 3,529.

All-time low counts were recorded for Canvasback 1, Ring-billed Gull 268, House Finch 137, and House Sparrow 263.

The birds that have been seen on more than half of the counts but missed this year were Snow Goose, Tundra Swan, American Coot, Eastern Phoebe, Gray Catbird, and Purple Finch.

Many people contributed to the success of the day. Fifty-nine observers spent 174.2 hours and covered 114.7 miles on foot and 379.6 miles by car. Another 11.8 hours were spent feeder watching, plus 5 hours stationary and 3 hours of owling.

As co-compiler, Joe Byrnes did the preparatory work for the count. As usual, he handled multiple details with precision and care. Chuck Stirrat summarized the area worksheets and provided field and feeder checklists. Area leaders arranged coverage, did follow-up if necessary, and compiled area totals. Their names are in boldface below (*anyone who counted in more than one area or also at a feeder is listed just once*). Once again, we thank Karen and Jeff Culler for generously serving as hosts for the tally and welcoming us to their home.

Land permission from Howard County Dept. of Recreation and Parks, Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission, and many private property owners assure good coverage—we are extremely grateful.

2012 was an exceptional year adding two first-ever county birds. The Pink-footed Goose was a first for the state and the Sabine's Gull was a county first. Both birds were very cooperative and well over 100 birders saw each one.

We tallied 240 species making 2012 our second best year in the past 34 years. In addition to the two species mentioned above, we found a Brant (the third all-time and first since 1959), Le Conte's Sparrow, Wilson's Phalarope, Red Crossbill, and 19 species of shorebirds. 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MAY COUNT IS SATURDAY, MAY 11, 2013

The May Count, which is timed to coincide with the peak of spring migration, is held on the second Saturday in May. This year it is on May 11th. This is by far the most exciting time of year for birding. This is the time of year when you will see or hear the largest number of species. Spring migrants are passing through on their way north; summer residents are back; and some winter migrants are still hanging around. If you are new to birding and want to get a jump start, this is an excellent way to get started. Over the last 10 years across the county, we have tallied an average of 147 species during the May Count.

For the count, Howard County is divided into seven areas. A map of each area can be found on the club's website, <u>http://</u> <u>www.howardbirds.org/howard/maycount.htm</u>. Each area has an Area Coordinator (**Area 1** Wes Earp 410-531-3197, **Area 2** Tom Strikwerda 301-942-2841, **Area 3** Chuck Stirrat 410-531-2417, **Area 4** Mike McClure 410-531-2780, **Area 5** Karen Darcy 443-857-1789, **Area 6** Bonnie Ott 443-285-3302, **Area 7** John McKitterick 410-997-3122) who communicates with the counters, assigns territories, and compiles area results. If you are a beginner, ask to be paired with a more experienced birder. Since the point is to tally every individual bird, extra eyes and ears are helpful. If you want to see a particular species, give me a call (410-418-8731) and I will try to place you in a location where you might have a good chance of seeing that bird.

At the end of the day, all of the counters are invited to a tally rally at **Kathie Lillie's** house (note, new location for tally rally) to share what was seen and come up with the county totals. It is a great opportunity to relax, swap stories of the day, and find out what everyone else has seen. (Directions to Kathie's house will be provided by the area coordinators.) Please call Kathie in advance (410-489-5262) and let her know how many are coming from your party and your choice of food or beverage to bring. Dinner will begin at 7 p.m. and the tally will start at 8 p.m. The completed checklist must be turned in to the area coordinators at the tally rally. If you cannot make it, be sure that your checklist gets delivered or gets called in by 7 p.m. We will find out what rarities were seen and often go out the next day to try to relocate them. Come join us!
