Thursday, January 12, 2023 "The 2022 Howard County Butterfly Survey Results" by Kevin Heffernan. For the fifth year in a row, Kevin Heffernan will update us on the status of butterflies in Howard County.

Kevin is the Co-chair of the Howard County, Maryland, Butterfly Survey. He is a past president of the Howard County Bird Club and is encouraging the planting of native pollinator gardens as part of the Howard Bee City Pollinator Committee, and the Habitat Creation and Enhancement and Pesticide Reduction Subcommittees.

Thursday, February 9, 2023 "Colombia, South America" by Allen R. Lewis. Allen has visited Colombia on three different trips since the mid 90's. He will introduce us to a country which is much more than one of the world's best bird-watching destinations.

Allen grew up in the Finger Lakes area of western New York State. Upon completing graduate school, he worked for 30 years as a professor of biology at the University of Puerto Rico in Mayaguez. Subsequent to retirement, Allen and wife, Laurie, moved to Maryland where their children and grandchildren settled. Also, they became active members of the Howard County Bird Club.

Although special field trips and events were scheduled throughout the year in cooperation with Field Trip Chair Joe Hanfman and Potluck Coordinator Sherry Tomlinson, the major celebration was planned for the last weekend of October (near the November 1, 1972 founding date), at Mount Pleasant, Howard County Conservancy. The morning of Saturday, October 29, was designated as a field day, while Sunday, October 30, would be an event in the Gudelsky Environmental Education Center featuring a program, displays, prizes, awards, and, of course, a cake.

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Saturday, October 29, 2022 - Field Day, 8:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.

The day included a bird walk, a habitat walk, and a staffed Skywatch. Joe Hanfman had requested reservations for the walks to gauge the number of leaders required. Everyone involved with the planning knew the weather would be the determining factor in turnout. Fortunately, skies were mostly sunny, the northeast breeze was light, and temperatures were mostly in the 50s and low 60s.

Prior to the beginning of the birding activities, President Kristin Trouton and Joe Hanfman welcomed the group, distributed souvenirs, and conducted drawings for half a dozen prizes. Bird walk attendees were divided into two groups, one led by Bonnie Ott and the other by Kurt Schwarz. The combined species trip list reached 47 with special sightings of one Lincoln's Sparrow and 26 Purple Finches (probably more than the total reported most of the previous winter). Both bird trips eventually ended at the Chandler Robbins' Skywatch where Wes and Sue Earp and Ralph Cullison, along with a few other enthusiasts, had been scanning for raptors. Wes had brought a whiteboard on which he kept a running total of species and numbers. There was no major flight, but six Bald Eagles were notable, as was a flock of 14 Eastern Meadowlarks. The most exciting sighting at the Skywatch was a loose group of 11 Common Ravens, one of the highest numbers ever seen in the county.

Sue Muller led a habitat walk at 10:00 a.m. The fields, woods, scrubby edges, and wetlands provided excellent variety within a limited area. In addition to surveying the beaver dam in the Davis Branch area, the group examined a dead ash tree killed by emerald ash borers, noted a fungus on that tree, looked at leafminers on oak leaves, and checked goldenrod galls.

Sunday, October 30, 2022 – Celebration at Gudelsky Environmental Education Center, 1:00 – 4:00 p.m. Much of the success of this event was thanks to many enthusiastic volunteers. Although a core group had signed up ahead of time for specific tasks, an unanticipated number of people showed up early or stayed late simply asking,

"How can I help?" Woody Merkle arrived early to assist staff member Heather Johannes hang photos. As chair of the physical arrangements, he capably directed setup and, later, cleanup. A registration table was placed in the lobby, tables for displays and prizes were distributed around the periphery of the large room, and rows of chairs were arranged for the program. The hospitality session ran from 1:00 – 2:15 p.m. Sunny skies with a high in the mid-60s enabled food to be served and eaten on the covered deck where most people felt comfortable removing their masks.

The program began at 2:15 p.m. with introductory remarks by President Kristin Trouton. This was followed by Howard County Conservancy Executive Director Meg Boyd's warm welcome detailing the lengthy link between the two organizations. MOS President Bonnie Borsa's remarks noted the important contributions the chapter had made to the state organization. Kristin read a congratulatory message from Jane Robbins on behalf of the Chandler Robbins family. Special guests were Howard County Department of Recreation and Parks Director, Raul DeLerme, and Natural Resources Conservation Manager, Brenda Belensky, as well as MOS Vice-president Evelyn Ralston.

To illustrate some of the changes that have taken place in five decades, Founder Nanine Rhinelander and Founding Committee member David Holmes reminisced about the early years of the club in a Zoom presentation, The Early Years. The interview had been conducted in person by David Sandler and recorded by Kelsey Wellons.

Another fifty-year member, Joanne Solem, narrated The First Fifty Years, a 30-minute PowerPoint of club high-

lights. As a part of this presentation, field trip leaders were recognized for their essential role in the club's history. At the end, the 50th Anniversary Committee members were introduced. Jo then acknowledged various groups of individuals who had provided significant leadership and support over the years including former presidents, all elected officers, individuals who had headed committees, seasonal counts, atlases, seed sales, or major research efforts, those who edited the newsletter or managed the bookstore, as well as those who had served on committees, atlas block captains, area count coordinators, hospitality contributors, or a host of others who had made quiet, but essential, contributions. The 35 individuals who had been members for more than 40 years were also recognized as were those who had been members for 25-39 years. Finally, those 35 individuals who had completed the 50th Anniversary Challenge received a round of applause.


Kristin Trouton presented a number of awards. Nanine Rhinelander was recognized as the Founder of the Howard County Bird Club, while David Holmes received a Valued

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Service Award for his varied and lengthy service. Kristin also gave Founders Awards to Joanne Solem and Bob Solem. Jo was surprised with a photo of two of the county's recent special birds, Anhinga and Western Kingbird, her 299th and 300th Howard County bird species.

Drawings for the major door prizes completed the indoor portion of the program. The final event was the anniversary cake-cutting by Nanine and Kristin, followed by additional time for eating, chatting, and looking at historical items, photo displays, and butterfly/pollinator material.

As Woody and his volunteers put the room and deck back in order, the sun set on a memorable celebratory weekend.

MARYLAND/DC BREEDING BIRD ATLAS 3, 2020-2024

It is hard to believe we are nearing the end of the third year of surveys for the Breeding Bird Atlas. The season though is not over by any means! In early November, Clayton Koonce documented a Bald Eagle flying north over Lake Kittamaqundi carrying nesting material. This is a great time to be watching what these birds are doing. If you are lucky, you will witness a courtship display where they lock talons in mid-air! We currently have six known nest locations in Howard County. If we locate a nest in the Columbia lakes area, that will be #7! Also remember to check cell towers for nesting activity, we do have one pair in Laurel nesting on a cell tower. Please let your County Coordinators know if you witness a bird carrying nest material or performing a courtship display (howard@mdbirds.org).

I will also remind everyone that come December 15th, the Great Horned Owl will be in "safe dates" once again. This means if you hear one calling or a pair duetting, this should be entered into your eBird checklist with the appropriate breeding code. We have confirmed this species in nine of our 24 assigned blocks, many more to document. If you are reading this and you are not an atlaser but have owls nesting in your yard, let your County Coordinators (howard@mdbirds.org) know and one of us will come over to document them. You can also send photos of baby owls for a confirmation.

Finally, thanks to all of you who have submitted breeding checklists into eBird. You are the people that make this study happen! If you are new and want to get involved, just email your County Coordinators and we will get you started!

New County Species


